





The First Lesson, Isaiah 47:1-15

Come down and sit in the dust,
O virgin daughter of Babylon;
sit on the ground without a throne,

strip off your robe, uncover your legs, pass through the rivers.

on the aged you made your yoke exceedingly heavy.

You said, "I shall be mistress for ever," so that you did not lay these things to heart or remember their end.

Now therefore hear this, you lover of pleasures, who sit securely,

who say in your heart,

"I am, and there is no one besides me;

I shall not sit as a widow

or know the loss of children":

These two things shall come to you in a moment, in one day;

the loss of children and widowhood shall come upon you in full measure, in spite of your many sorceries and the great power of your enchantments.

You felt secure in your wickedness, you said, "No one sees me"; your wisdom and your knowledge led you astray, and you said in your heart, "I am, and there is no one besides me." But evil shall come upon you, for which you cannot atone; disaster shall fall upon you, which you will not be able to expiate; and ruin shall come on you suddenly, of which you know nothing.

Stand fast in your enchantments and your many sorceries, with which you have labored from your youth; perhaps you may be able to succeed, perhaps you may inspire terror.

You are wearied with your many counsels; let them stand forth and save you, those who divide the heavens, who gaze at the stars, who at the new moons predict what shall befall you.

Behold, they are like stubble,
the fire consumes them;
they cannot deliver themselves
from the power of the flame.
No coal for warming oneself is this,
no fire to sit before!
Such to you are those with whom you have labored,

But he answered them, "The man who healed me said to me, 'Take up your pallet, and walk.'" They asked him, "Who is the man who said to you, 'Take up your pallet, and walk'?" Now the man who had been healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had withdrawn, as there was a crowd in the place. Afterward, Jesus found him in the temple, and said to him, "See, you are well! But Jesus answered them, "My Father is working still, and I am working." 


